ATOPIC DERMATITIS IN AN ENGLISH BULLDOG TREATED BY OUR DERMATO PROTECT KIBBLES

The dog's skin constitutes a protective barrier between its external environment and its body. The skin and the coat are the first representation of the dog's health and of its diet quality. The typical sign of skin sensitivity is itching (pruritus) and scratching. It is the cause of lesions and the starting point for skin complications.

Skin and coat need specific nutrients to renew and to maintain a good health. The diet must be composed in nutrients which are known to support skin's activities. This includes **high quality and very digestible proteins** to be easily assimilated and to provide the essential amino acids necessary for your dog.

In his nutrition, the dog must also find **polyunsaturated fatty acids (omega 3 and omega 6).** These help to develop strong skin and silky coat. Omega-3 also help to control itching and skin inflammation. **Vitamins, combined with zinc and biotin**, contribute to the proper functioning of the epidermis. Copper contributes to the coat pigmentation.

Dogs can be sensitive, or even allergic, to food components. This can lead to signs of skin inflammation.



Our **DERMATO Protect** food is a complete veterinary diet for adult dogs, specially designed to:

- Minimize risk of food intolerance, through a very limited number of novel protein sources (duck, fish and peas);

We are presenting you the clinical case of Oscar, a 3-year-old male English Bulldog.

This companion was properly vaccinated and treated against external and internal parasites. Oscar showed itching, a very patchy or inconsistent hair loss and reddening and thickening of the skin. These signs evolved during several months (Picture 1).
